IMPORTANT: The below has been collated as an exercise before the event. This does NOT replace the need for ALL coaches and leaders to perform an ongoing dynamic risk assessment throughout the event. It is assumed that for all risks, ongoing dynamic risk assessments will be conducted.

An angling lake with a restaurant on-site that is used by the club. The home of HCC and therefore the site has storage containers for the majority of the clubs equipment. Launching is done by the containers with dedicated decking and a seal launch point.

At the far side of the lake there are high banks, but generally land access is easy around the whole lake.

Anglers are usually positioned on the lake opposite the restaurant.

Drowning	All paddlers	Generic: All water users to wear suitable buoyancy aids Coaches/Leaders to ensure buoyancy aids are worn correctly and are suitable for the water being paddled No one can be on the water before a coach or suitable leader is on the water Site Specific: A level 2 coach must be present Paddlers without a coach or suitable supervision, must be in a group of at least 3 paddlers and be a minimum of 2 star All paddlers under 16 years old must wear a helmet whilst on the water Further Actions: New paddlers must be taught how to check buoyancy aids are fitted correctly Buoyancy aids to be checked at the start of each season − and comply to relevant standards	2	5	10

Hypothermia	All Participants	Generic: All participants to wear appropriate clothing Coaches/Leaders to have briefed paddlers about what they should be wearing Group shelter and first aid kit is available to be used if required Suitable first aider should be present	1	4	4

Quality of access point	All Participants	Site Specific: The access slope becomes extremely slippery when wet so members should be warned of this A responsible adult should be supervising the access point to assist anybody who might slip Coaches should ensure no paddlers go underneath the launch platform Coaches should be cautious of glass in the water especially around the bar area	3	4	12
Cut feet / glass	All Participants	Site Specific: Coaches should be cautious of glass in the water especially around the bar area The person opening up the site should check for glass around the access point All paddlers are to wear footwear with a solid sole to stop broken bottles and tin cans from cutting feet	3	3	9
Line of sight around island	All Paddlers	Site Specific: The island prevents full line of site and therefore a coach must check around the island at the end of each session Paddlers without a coach or suitable supervision, must be in a group of at least 3 paddlers and be a minimum of 2 star	1	1	1
